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



WHAT matters most in a school is the quality of teaching. In our commitment to our students we have undertaken this Spring Term to invite Ofsted inspectors to come and judge the quality of our teaching in every subject. It is two years since the school was last inspected and we wished to be sure that we had maintained and indeed improved upon all that was judged to be outstanding in 2011. We have not been disappointed. Inspectors have expressed universal praise for the following things. They found the behaviour of students to be exemplary both in the classroom and around the school. They commented on the innovative and creative ways that teachers seek to teach. They were impressed by the number and range of students whose confidence and initiative assists not only their own learning but that of other students. They were impressed by the school's approach to student workbooks and by the detailed marking that they found in many of them. In some subject areas towards 80% of teaching was judged to be outstanding. Where teaching was not found to be outstanding it was with only some exceptions found to be good or good with some outstanding features. Teaching across the full range of age and ability was reviewed including the Sixth Form and students who have special educational needs. These judgements help us as leaders calibrate our own views and signal for us where extra help and support is needed. The inspectors also gave some useful tips for future practice. They would like to see even more students be less reliant on teachers' guidance and control; more initiative on the part of students. The inspectors were, of course, blown away by the quality of the building, facilities and resources. They were equally astounded by the energy, drive and commitment of so many teachers.
