Covid restrictions on schools in both Sudans means pupils stay at home

On the 8th September Sudan reported 13,437 cases and 833 reported deaths, in South Sudan 2,545 case with 48 reported deaths Schools have been closed, but the Bishop of Salisbury's appeal for the Sudan has raised over £78,300; equal amounts being sent to both countries to buy and distribute soap and sanitizer


Support of Primary and Secondary Schools in Southern Sudan with science projects, teacher training, buying school equipment and desks and supporting children on bursaries

The Opening of a Teacher Training course.

- Teachers from 6 Basic Juba Diocese schools attend.
- 2019 course had 55 attendees.
- The course is held in January during the long school holiday and paid for by Salisbury.
- Teachers in South Sudan often have no formal teaching qualifications, these courses raise their skill level.
- They are poorly paid even by South Sudanese standards.
 This training shows them that they are held in high regard and encourages them to stay in the profession.
- The training works, exam results have increased by 10% since the 1st course in 2015.
