God and the sustainability of the earth: interpreting Islamic traditions

In the Holy Qur'an, God is the Creator of everything, the Sustainer of life on Earth and the One who balances creation. God has made humans his *khalifah* – trustees, guardians or vicegerents – on Earth. Muslim attitudes to the creation are worked out from the verse in the Qur'an, answering the question: what does it mean to be God's trustee in caring for the world he made?

- i. With a partner, read the Quranic text and the eight interpretations around it. For each one, say to your partner at least one practical difference it would make in the life of a Muslim how would they act as a result, and why?
- ii. Decide together which interpretation is most likely to have an impact on a Muslim and why. There is no single right answer it depends on all kinds of factors but think carefully and offer explanations.

A. All good Muslims should thank God for their lives – it's God who created us.	B. This verse shows clearly why Muslims, along with people of other faiths, should treat the Earth with respect – it's because God made it, so we have no right to spoil it.	C. It is understanding our role as guardians of the balance of the Earth established by God that leads some Muslims to campaign for ecological causes, to be eco-workers for God's world.
D. 'The Explanation' is ' <i>al-bayan</i> ' – speech, thought, reason; you can read it as a way of looking at human science – good Muslim scientists submit their knowledge to God, and recognise that God alone is the 'All Knowing'.	'The All Merciful has taught the Qur'an. He [God] created man and taught him the Explanation. The sun and the moon run their measured circuits, the stars and the trees bow themselves. Heaven - He raised it up and set the Balance. Transgress not in the balance.'	E. Nature is balanced by God, and by all other species – it is only humans that corrupt the world and destroy the balance. It is part of our submission to God that we keep the balance of life too.
F. In this verse, even the trees bow to God – but humans often don't; they corrupt the Earth instead. God is merciful, but will judge.	G. 'The Balance' that God has set may be the scales of justice that are to be used on the Day of Judgment.	H. God's blessings include all that is good in nature and creation. We should not disown or deny these blessings, but cherish them and rejoice in them. Good Muslims will love nature.
