Serious obstacles

The Archbishop of Canterbury and Pope Benedict XVI have publicly acknowledged that "serious obstacles" stand in the way of their Churches' cooperating reports BBC News this morning. The Archbishop is on a short visit to Rome. In a joint declaration, they said it was a matter of urgency that talks continue on issues which divide them. It comes amid concerns in the Roman Catholic Church over women bishops and the gay issue. Bishops back student fight for religious freedom on campus

Some of Britain's most senior religious figures call today for an end to "intolerant and unlawful" attempts to restrict the rights of Christian Unions on university campuses. In a letter to The Times, eight bishops, as well as the former Archbishop of Canterbury, are among those who urge student associations and university authorities to take action to halt the alleged discrimination. Thousands of Christians on campuses across Britain claim that their right to freedom of expression is being challenged by student associations attempting to force Christian Unions to allow anybody, regardless of faith, ethnicity or sexuality, to sit on their ruling committees and to address their meetings. Furlong growth plans unveiled

An artist's impression of the new Furlong Centre. A multi-million pound draft proposal to radically reshape Ringwood town centre was unveiled this week. The £4 million plan is expected to create up to 20,000 sq ft of new retail space, public open spaces and town centre residential accommodation in a bid to breathe new life into the area between the Furlong Centre and Market Place. The project is likely to take about a year to complete.

Knife survey leads to shock statistics

An undercover survey has revealed more than one in three Wiltshire traders sold knives to underage teenagers, and three of the offending shops were in Salisbury. Trading Standards Officers at Wiltshire county council carried out the survey during half term week. They visited 54 retailers and found that 19 of those sold a knife to an underage person. It is an offence under the Offensive Weapons Act 1996 to sell knives, blades, axes or any other article with a blade to a person under 16 years old.

Fatal crashes claim lives

Horrific crashes on Dorset roads have claimed 25 lives since April, latest figures have revealed. The tragic deaths of four people in just four days over the last week have highlighted the dangers faced by road users in the county. Head of road policing Rick Dowell stressed the circumstances of each crash were unique and said no common factor is to blame.
