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MMM! That was the expression on everybody's lips as they sampled the scrummy entries for this week's final of the Great Springdene Bake Off. It's been a great couple of months, where residents have shown off their culinary skills to perfection and had bags of fun in the process.

The latest creation is Mary Berry's 'Wimbledon Cake", named after the legendary tennis tournament. We chose it because it was described as a "showstopper" – and what a showpiece it turned out to be! A very light sponge, made with semolina, whipped egg whites, sugar, egg yolks, orange zest and juice, then layered with fresh whipped cream, strawberries and passionfruit.

The cakes baked by all three homes were absolutely divine! Eat on same day as baking, it said in the recipe – and that was what folk hungrily did. And, as we're sure you've all come to expect, the decorations were stunning once more. One of the homes added some flaked almonds and a hint of fresh mint, another a mango rose, and the final cake had a thin layer of strawberry jam as well as the other fillings. Delicious!

The winners were announced via a Microsoft Teams call on Wednesday morning involving all three homes and families, too. As always it had been excruciatingly hard to choose between such brilliant creations, but in the end the judges plumped for Spring Grove.

Our chief taster Eirlys noted: "The thin layering of this cake meant that you really got all of the flavours from every fruit used. The cake was very light and fluffy and because it had been sliced thinly, came with mountains of cream and other delicious fruity notes. You could really taste the orange in the sponge, then got an aftertaste of the passionfruit and strawberry which was really refreshing."

However, the ultimate triumph went to the Spring Lane team (pictured below), who won the entire contest with 45 points, with Spring Grove and Springview the runners up, gaining 40 and 20 points respectively. The Spring Lane bakers were presented with a super trophy commissioned by Eirlys. Well done, everybody! Look forward to seeing you next year.
