She was thrilled to get a video message from club legend Gary Mabbutt and to receive a congratulatory letter from head coach Jose Mourinho, who expressed the hope that she will be back in the stadium soon. The club told her they will be putting the photograph of her, dressed in her club kit, in the next match programme.

Irene was over the moon. "I had a great day – so many memories," she said as she tucked into her birthday cake, iced in the team colours, while everyone sang Happy Birthday. Congratulations, Irene – may you score many more birthdays yet!

It's always a pleasure to hear warm words from Springdene relatives and friends – and this week families of folk at Springview have been chatting to us about the experiences of their loved ones in the home.

Tricia Ellis from Enfield is delighted with the welfare of her mother, Harriet Cullen. "You're doing a great job," she says. "We're so grateful. Mum is 97 and doing really well. She's been with Springdene for two years. She's a bit deaf and it is not easy to talk to her on mobile devices, but I know she's all right because of all the little things the carers do for her. We are completely reassured. It's like being part of a big family. But it must be so hard for the carers!

"The nice thing is that everybody knows Mum so well. And she has her pen pal in Cornwall, introduced by Eirlys. We quite understand that, because of the pandemic, visiting is not possible at the moment, but Mum is very well off where she is. She probably had a better Christmas than we did!"

Tricia generously shows her appreciation by bringing in cupcakes, cookies and muffins for the staff every week. Thank you, Tricia. It is a lovely gesture.

Another very happy family are Dyann and Steve Rowe, also from Enfield. Steve's mother Joan, who is 96, has been with Springview for five years and the Rowes think her care is "brilliant".

"She's really blossomed," says Dyann. "The way she is looked after is really outstanding. Joan is a quiet person and loves all the attention she gets. The staff are so lovely and so considerate. And the food is great, too. Steve adds: "You have done so much to make my mother's life worth living." (Thanks, Dyann and Steve, for the chocolate biscuits you drop in regularly for the carers.)

We're pleased to report that folk in all three homes are flourishing. The staff have been working very hard to keep Covid at bay, and all locations are currently infection-free. We are keeping our fingers crossed that the immunity from the vaccinations is beginning to kick in – although everyone will need a second dose for it to be fully effective.

It's wonderful, too, how much everyone has been pulling together. The catering staff at Springview have even been giving up their breaks to assemble the boxes we use to send the Covid swab tests off for processing. Thank you, Dawn, Ingrid, Phil and Tom.

Meanwhile, night-carer Lillian Zhao has donated 80 boxes containing 500ml bottles of sanitising gel through the auspices of the church where she worships – the True Life Church. It's a very generous gift for which we are hugely grateful. Thanks, too to an organisation called Cards of Care, for delivering some heart-shaped bunting which brought great cheer to Spring Grove.

Life is bustling for our activities teams. We extend a warm welcome to Malwina who is joining us at Springview. Malwina, who hails from Poland but has been living in London for the past five years, specialises in drama and arts and crafts. She is also a qualified fitness instructor so will be keeping everybody on their toes!

Ken talked with typical modesty, about his courageous missions in an interview with James Anderson, our financial manager, who is a big fan of his: "We just went," said Ken. But weren't you frightened? "The point is, you had to do it. It was your job. So, you just went. I was confident with the rest of the boys that we'd get through safely. I just sat there and trusted in the rest of the crew that we would be safe and sound. You had to think like that. You had to just get on with it and get it over with."

Farewell, Ken. You were among the last of a very special breed and we salute you!

On a lighter note, our Springview reception manager Kathy has issued a challenge to Health Secretary Matt Hancock. "You may have noticed that when he appears on the television or in the Commons, he is always wearing an NHS badge on his lapel, but never one that says CARE. So, I have written to him to say let's hear it for the hundreds of thousands of care workers you represent, who have served so selflessly on the front line during the pandemic."
